Peter Lattey who collects books for the Rotary Club is headed to Kenya and wanted to take some children's books. Robin, Peter and I culled about three boxes. I suspect that you will not miss them...except for the milk crate of classics. Anyway, just a heads up. They are going to a place that needs books.

Together with Brett Weiss and the Weiss Scholarship Foundation, the Hermosa Rotary provides scholarships to Kenyan students who otherwise would not receive a high school education. Peter reports: "Our scholars just started high school via boarding school and it is a very big deal! If it wasn't for outside support, many would be home instead." Peter and Brett share hopes to empower and improve the structure for educational opportunity, embodying the Foundation's core belief that education is the only long-term, sustainable solution to poverty.



Peter Lattey with an update from Kenya:

"What I have been doing for books up until now is to bring small quantities of kids' books each time I come to Kenya. I donate these to the library in one of the local schools. Usually they are almost the only books in the library.

However, I am about to start on a much bigger project. The town of Migori has a population of about 100,000. There is no public library. Last week I met with the governor of the county and reached an agreement with them that the county will build a new public library building and provide staff for it. Rotary International will provide books, bookshelves, furniture, computers, etc. As you can imagine I am very excited about this."
